Explore a variety of spontaneous painting techniques that include monoprinting, salt-resist, spraying, stamping and manipulating various types of fabric and fusible web to create wonderful patterns. Then compose textural surfaces by layering the materials to make small works with an organic feel. Working with silks, cottons, cheesecloth, tyvek™, and scrim, we'll create fabrics with an eye for color and texture, then cut, rip, layer, distort and fuse them to surfaces prepared with painted fusible web. We'll stitch into these surfaces with hand embroidery for additional texture and emphasis. You can complete several small works or a number of samples during the class. Class fee to instructor: \$55 includes fabric paints, 1 yard each of silk, cotton, scrim, silk net, cheesecloth, ½ yard tyvek™, foils, spray bottles, brayer and class handouts.

Supplies:

1. White or natural colored cotton, silk or linen fabric, prewashed in hot water and ironed, approx. two to four yards. Do NOT use fabric softener when you dry. We'll be painting approximate fat quarter sized pieces. If available, you can buy PFD (prepared for dyeing) fabrics, although they are not necessary.
2. A soft graphite pencil
3. Notebook/sketchbook
4. Eraser
5. Sharpie™ ultra-fine tip pen
6. Inexpensive foam and bristle brushes with wooden handles -4-5 each (check your local home store paint department for various widths; stick with the smaller sizes.) Mark your name on them before class.
7. Small plastic containers for water
8. Plastic containers with lids for mixing and storing paint (margarine tubs, etc.)
9. Two 8" x 10" or 9" x 12" plexiglass pieces from Home Depot or Lowe's – these look like little window pane replacements, which is probably what they are used for in real life!
10. Basic Sewing supplies -- pins, scissors, seam ripper, needle threader, small embroidery scissors, embroidery hoop.
11. Chenille needles—size 22 and 24; DMC embroidery threads in a variety of colors you like.
12. Wonder Under™—2-3 yards (the light style you can sew through, not the craft variety or Steam A Seam™ 2 Light. Do NOT buy Heat and Bond™ (doesn't work for painting) or any brand that doesn't have a paper backing.
13. Thin batting for several fat quarter size sandwiches, like Quilters Dream™.
14. Household sponges, small ones, take out of package and let them dry.
15. Plant mister style spray bottle for water.
16. Roll of contractor's sheet plastic- (4 ml.) for drying painted fabrics (available in the painting departments of Lowe's and Home Depot).

Please feel free to e-mail me if you have any questions about this list; I'll be happy to help clarify anything that sounds confusing. Please remember to bring a smock, an apron or just wear old clothes. Fabric paints stain quickly.
